1. Introduction

- 1.1 The Dumfries and Galloway Integration Scheme was approved by Scottish Ministers on the 3rd October 2015. This report is presented to inform the IJB of the legal requirements on both Dumfries and Galloway Council and NHS Dumfries and Galloway to prepare a successor Integration Scheme in line with the Public Bodies (Joint Working) (Scotland) Act 2014.
- 1.2 However in March 2020 Scottish Government informed Chief Officers of Integration Authorities, Chief Executives of NHS Boards and Chief Executives of Local Authorities that they did not require a successor Integration Scheme due to the ongoing CoVID 19 response but that NHS Boards and Local Authorities should carry out a minimum requirement of a review of the current Integration Scheme.

2. Recommendations

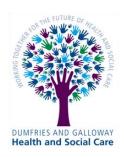
2.1 The Integration Joint Board is asked to note:

- That in line with the Public Bodies (Joint Working) (Scotland) Act 2014, NHS Dumfries and Galloway and Dumfries and Galloway Council require to review the Integration Scheme for approval by Scottish Government on or before the 3rd October 2020
- The correspondence received from Scottish Government in March 2020
- That the Chair will write to the Chief Executives of the Local Authority and the NHS Board to advise them of the timescales for completion of a review of the Dumfries and Galloway Integration Scheme

3. Background and Main Report

- 3.1 The Public Bodies (Joint Working) (Scotland) Act 2014, (the Act) outlines that there is a statutory duty to prepare an Integration Scheme which sets out which integration model is to apply, the functions to be delegated from each organisation and the financial arrangements and payments for these functions.
- 3.2 Following approval of the original Integration Scheme between NHS Dumfries and Galloway and Dumfries and Galloway Council by Scottish Parliament on the 3rd October 2015, the Integration Joint Board became a legal entity in its own right.
- 3.3 Section 44 (5) of the Act stipulates that the Local Authority and Health Board must carry out a review of the scheme before the expiry of the relevant period, which for Dumfries and Galloway is the 3rd October 2020.
- In March 2020, the Scottish Government wrote to the Chief Officers of all Integration Authorities, NHS Board Chief Executives and Local Authority Chief Executives to advise that due to local health and social care systems planning their response to the CoVID 19 situation, and in view of announcements made by the First Minister and the Cabinet Secretary for Health and Sport on the stringent new measure now in force throughout the UK to slow the impact of the virus, they do not expect work to continue on developing successor schemes. For clarity, the Act does not require the Health Board and Local Authority to produce a successor scheme, it requires a review. To: Chief Officers Integration Authorities NHS Board Chief Executives Local Authority Chief Executives

Dear Colleagues

As part of the work for establishing local arrangements for integration, the Public Bodies (Joint Working) (Scotland) Act 2014 required each Health Board and corresponding Local Authority to jointly prepare an Integration Scheme that set out which integration model was to apply, the functions to be delegated, and the financial arrangements and payments for the functions.

The legislation also requires the Local Authority and Health Board to review the Integration Scheme before the expiry date, which is five years after the scheme was approved in parliament. This means that many Integration Schemes are currently due for review.

Given the current work across local health and social care systems to plan their response to Covid -19, and in view of announcements made by the First Minister and the Cabinet Secretary for Health and Sport on the stringent new measures now in force throughout the UK to slow the impact of the virus, please note that we do not expect you to continue work on developing successor schemes.

For absolute clarity, the Act does not require the Health Board and Local Authority to produce a successor scheme, it requires a *review*. You should therefore ensure that you jointly carry out the minimum requirement of a review, which most of you have already undertaken, and that this is acknowledged jointly and formally. This review can note anything that requires further work between the partners and set out plans for the completion of that work at a later date, once the current very challenging situation passes, including the production of a successor scheme. Meantime, the current Integration Scheme will remain in force.
